The End or the Beginning?

We are wrapping up one year and approaching a new one. I think most people will look back on 2020 as a rough year. There was a worldwide pandemic, massive job losses, racial unrest, political jockeying, and much, much more. The coronavirus was probably the biggest newsmaker. It caused nations, states, and communities to enact restrictions and mandates that changed the way we interacted with one another.

As your senior pastor I think about how it has affected the life of the church. We haven't had worship in the sanctuary since March. This has meant we haven't had the privilege of worshipping from the place that so many of us consider sacred space. Furthermore, we haven't been able to see the people that we draw inspiration from when we worship together. I don't mean me or Julia or Christina or Hope. I mean your neighbors who sit beside, in front, and behind you on the pews.

Funerals have been held outdoors with just a few worshippers in attendance, and many were postponed until it is safe to gather in groups again. Weddings, too, have become very small outdoor affairs. We even celebrated baptisms outside of our usual place of worship. We didn't have the usual array of fellowship meals and fundraisers. Children, youth, adult, and senior activities all looked so different in 2020; and there was a lot not to like about it. But we did them because we loved the Lord, our God, and we loved our neighbors, and we wanted to keep people safe as we expressed our love.

I certainly don't want to go through a year like 2020 again; but I heard a compliment the other day that really made me proud. I was on a zoom call when one of our church members shared that a friend of hers told her, "Wrightsville has been the model for how to be the church during a pandemic." The person who said this did not go to our church. I couldn't believe what I was hearing. It has been such a trying year. But someone who doesn't go to our church noticed what we were doing and thought we were doing it right.

Well, we've certainly tried. I'm glad this person thought we were being a model church because some things we did well, and some things we didn't. But all in all, I am really proud of how Wrightsville United Methodist has responded to the pandemic. For instance:

We learned how to worship online. Who will ever forget the Easter sunrise making that bright orange cross as it came up over the horizon?

We all learned how to join meetings or classes through zoom calls on the computer or smart phone. Did you know that most of our administrative meetings actually had better attendance this past year than in years past?

We took inspiration with us from the morning devotions done by Pastor Christina, the evening devotions organized by Donna Pinckney, and the youth devotions delivered by our high school seniors.

Children (and a few adults too) learned new songs on Music Mondays with the help of our Children's Music Director, Courtney Rickert.

We had more children participate in Vacation Bible School this year than ever before because it was held online and wasn't constrained by how many people the church building could hold.

Families shared the responsibility of teaching children's Sunday School classes online each week.

We spread the message of the Gospel house by house with yard signs that let people know we were praying for our schools and reminding them to "Love Your Neighbor."

We had one of the best Methodist Men's Golf Tournaments ever, with far greater participation than we've had before in the five years I've been here.

We still had the Son Run, even though we couldn't all run at the same time.

We confirmed 26 young people in Christ this year, and 24 more will be confirmed in 2021.

Just in the last month alone we have gone the extra mile to love our neighbors as ourselves.

More than \$17,000 was donated through the church to our annual Street Turkeys of Wilmington food drive. And an additional \$9,000 was donated online.

95 children in the foster system with the Methodist Home for Children received gifts and toys this year because of your generosity through the Angel Tree program.

We helped those who have recently been released from prison with more than \$5,600 in donations to LINC. Those donations went to buy gift cards and stocking stuffers for adults trying to get re-established in the community again.

And we still have several more ministry drives scheduled for Christmas week to help those who need warm clothes, the sick, and kids in school; but they won't take place until after I've written this article.

I could keep giving more examples; but the bottom line is that we never stopped being the church in 2020, not even for a minute. Instead, we just did church in different ways than we've done it in the past. Don't get me wrong. I'm very much looking forward to returning to worship in the building and so many other things that I'm more accustomed to doing; but I'm proud of how flexible our church has been in difficult circumstances. If there's one thing I've been reminded of this year it is that God is with us through it all. May we continue to praise his name as we look forward to 2021.

Pastor Doug on Sabbatical

At the very beginning of 2020, weeks before the pandemic hit the United States, I entered into conversation with the Staff-Parish Relations Committee (SPRC) to discuss the possibility of a brief sabbatical. Sabbaticals are meant to help pastors rest, renew, and re-charge for future ministry. June of 2021 will mark 25 years in pastoral ministry, and while I never know for sure when I may be asked to move again, I am hopeful that I will continue to be at Wrightsville for many more years to come. The Lilly Endowment has a program where they supply grants to pastors and churches to help pay for sabbatical plans. My plan was to step away for the summer of 2021 and spend it visiting large and growing United Methodist churches around the country, talking with their lead pastors and staff about the programs and holy habits that they have used to sustain their churches and nurture their souls. Alas, the pandemic hit. My travel plan was foiled. I didn't get the grant.

But, the SPRC really liked the plan. They believe that the church will benefit from my continued growth and learning. Furthermore, with the ongoing issues occurring because of the coronavirus and the impending denominational split due to divisions over human sexuality they felt it was best to go ahead and get away so that I can be back to help lead us through the next year and beyond. So, I will be away from the office from January 10th through February 7th, 2021.

My plan will look very different from the one I submitted to the Lilly Endowment. Due to the pandemic I will not be travelling the country; but instead will be studying worship services and websites online and interviewing pastors and staff from other churches by phone. I am very excited about this opportunity and am grateful to the church for providing me with this time to learn and grow.

In addition, I have put on some weight in the last year that has triggered some important warning signs in regards to my personal health. Therefore, I am also hoping to use this time to create some better habits to improve my overall health, as well.

I really couldn't do this without the help of an incredible and supportive staff. We have the best, bar none. It is because of them that I believe our ministries will continue to flourish while I'm away. The usual responsibilities and decisions that the senior pastor has to take care of will be given over to our Associate Pastor, Christina Turner. If she needs help she'll be able to turn to our Staff-Parish Relations Committee for additional guidance. But, I have no worries. This experience should help Pastor Christina grow as a pastor, as well.

I will be away from Wrightsville Beach and will not be available for pastoral calls during this scheduled sabbatical. Pastor Christina and Pastor Hope will be on-call to handle any pastoral needs that may arise. Winter Reading List

Ready to snug in for January and read a good book or two? Looking for some new titles? Here are a few to consider:

The Gospel for the Person Who Has Everything by Will Willimon. Bishop William Willimon brings the Gospel of Jesus Christ to life for the person who has everything – happy, fulfilled human beings, who don't feel the same level of need expressed by the downcast, the outcast, the brokenhearted, and the miserable. We all have people in our lives who think they don't need Jesus. This book is Willimon's answer to the question, "What do you say to the person who says, through his or her neglect of the faith, 'Thanks, but I don't need it.?'"

What Would Granny Say? And Other Somewhat Embellished Memories by Tony Rowell. For decades, Rowell—a pastor, mission trip leader, songwriter, photographer and storyteller—has made it his passion to experience, gather and share stories of the Lord at work in big ways and small. Now, a lifetime of memories is offered in this collection of essays. From fishing with his granny in the Florida Panhandle to stumbling into boars and bear alike in the Carolina wilderness to ministry in Bolivia, Colombia and Latvia, Rowell weaves beauty with simplicity and good old-fashioned humor. Rev. Rowell is an elder in the South Carolina United Methodist Conference.

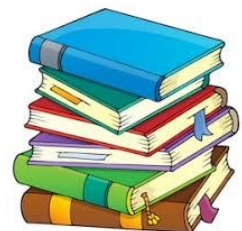
A House Divided: Engaging the Issues through the Politics of Compassion by Mark Feldmeir. Mark Feldmeir, pastor of a politically diverse United Methodist congregation, explores eight of the most divisive issues of our day—climate change, racism, immigration, healthcare, medical aid in dying, Islamic extremism, homosexuality, and social isolation and suicide—through the lens of "a politics of compassion," the motivating, unifying ideals of the gospel that insist that we work together for the benefit of the common good. Each chapter includes a study guide for small group conversations.

Building Resilience: When There's No Going Back to the Way Things Were by Alice Updike Scannell. How do we develop the resilience that empowers us to be ourselves in the face of change? This book offers a path toward creativity in responding to change in your life, regaining some control over your circumstances, and overcoming feelings of helplessness.

God and the Pandemic: A Christian Reflection on the Coronavirus and Its Aftermath by N. T. Wright. Discover a different way of seeing and responding to the Coronavirus pandemic, an approach drawing on Scripture, Christian history, and the way of living, thinking, and praying revealed to us by Jesus. Wright shows that a careful reading of the Bible and Christian history offers simple though profound answers to our many questions.

Beautiful and Terrible Things: A Christian Struggle with Suffering, Grief, and Hope by Christian M.M. Brady. With deep faith, knowledge of Scripture, and the wisdom that comes only from experience, Brady guides readers grieving losses and setbacks of all kinds in voicing their lament to God, reflecting on the nature of human existence, and persevering in hope.

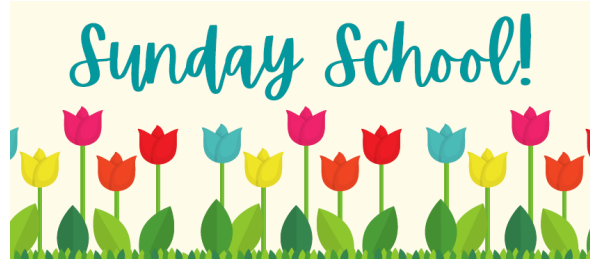

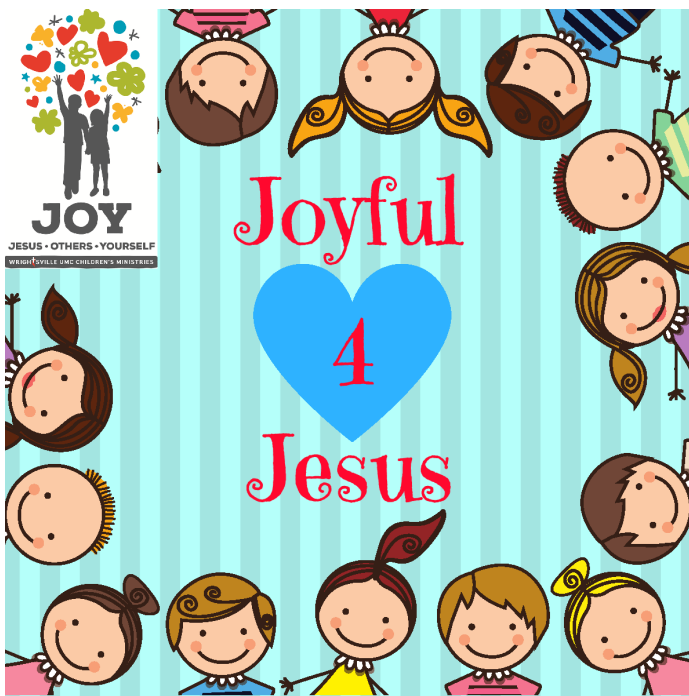
